Simple things, like facilitating maths and science at the five schools we are supporting with the provision of scientific calculators can now be placed at the top of our agenda."

While the Directors agree there is a lot still to do and She Is Forestry SA is only in its infancy, they are heartened by the progress it has made and proud of the impact it is having.

## WOMEN IN FORESTRY WEBINAR Thursday 26 August 2021

The second Women in Forestry Webinar was a watershed moment for She is Forestry SA organisers, with many expecting it would either make, or break, the initiative following the success of the 2020 Webinar hosted by NCT Forestry Agricultural Co-operative Ltd.

"The initial webinar was conceptualised, organised and rolled out within a month", explains She is Forestry SA Coordinator Khosi Mavimbela, FSCC. "A tiny team worked day and night, but the end result exceeded everyone's expectations. From this, She is Forestry SA was born and overnight, we became an organisation with a bank account, Directors and a Planning and Organising Committee (POC). While this had many benefits, it also created an expectation that any sequel to our first webinar would need to be bigger and better - the question was how?"

It was a question that caused a lot of head scratching and debate. The consensus was we needed to do something different. The

previous webinar had focused on looking back and documenting the, often difficult, journey of women into the industry. The second webinar needed to look forward, to present the industry as it is now - a fantastic opportunity for women looking for careers across many different paths.

"We have female Chainsaw Operators, Firefighters, Heavy Machinery Operators, Contractors, Foresters, Silviculture, Harvesting and Operation Managers, Nursery Supervisors, Heads of Research Departments, Junior and Senior Managers, C-suite and Executive Level Leaders. There is no position a woman cannot fill, if she has the commitment and passion needed to succeed in this industry. Indeed, women are not only filling positions, but they are also shaping the Sector as it tackles the issues of today and tries to find the solutions to the global challenges of the future". Khosi continues.

The webinar focused on the role of women in the Forestry Sector rather than solely gender, celebrating them as leaders in their respective



fields and highlighting their role in shaping the future of forestry. It also provided a platform for promoting these women, showcasing their passion and dedication to the industry, and positioning them as role models for future generations of women looking to enter the industry.

The second Women in Forestry webinar was opened by FSCC Executive Director Khosi Mavimbela, Acting DGG Pumeza Nodada – who gave the message of support on behalf of the Honorable Makhotso Sotyu, Deputy Minister of the Department of Forestry, Fisheries and the Environment (DFFE) – and FP&M Seta's Sylvia Tsunke who gave the key note message on behalf of CEO Dr Felleng Yende. Three powerful women, all of whom talked to the integral role women have in the industry and the need to promote more to ensure future generations of women see the Forestry Sector as a preferred career path.

The floor was then open to the Directors of She is Forestry, Bathobile Ntshingila, Nelly Malatji,

Julia Rees and Irene Mathabela who provided an impassioned discussion on the need for a Non-Profit Organisation aimed at raising the profile of women, before laying out its vision and objectives.

The main body of the webinar consisted of five themes, starting with the Merensky sponsored discussion panel hosted by Sappi's Mpho Lethoko entitled "An Industry for All". The panel included corporate representative Masechaba

Chifunyise from Merensky, family-run business owner Julia Rees from Dargle Poles and small-scale grower representative & FSA Executive Committee Chairperson Mama Busi Mnguni. The ladies discussed the role of women in different scales of forestry operations and the interconnected nature of the forestry sector, which makes collaboration paramount.

This was followed by the Sappi sponsored theme "Sustainable Forestry" presentation by the Chairperson of FSA's Environmental Management Committee Louise van Wyk. Louise spoke about what sustainability meant in a forestry context and the interconnected nature of environmental, social and economic sustainability. She also spoke about the need

for a bottom-up approach when looking at sustainability going forward and the challenges the industry faces.

"Entrepreneurism in Forestry" was the third theme sponsored by Sabie Poles and hosted by their owner Marina Daniel. The theme included presentations by Itumeleng Langeni from MTO and Thobi Mkhize from Mondi, who showcased some of the entrepreneurial based projects currently underway in the communities that neighbour forestry landholdings. This theme saw the greatest audience interaction, with numerous audience members voicing their support and pride for these initiatives.

Theme four, "Forestry – investing in the future" was sponsored by Sawmilling South Africa and involved presentations by Dr Eija Laitinen, Head of the Forest21 Programme and Dr Tatenda Mapeto, Lecturer at Nelson Mandela University (NMU). Both women discussed how forestry graduates needed to be problem-solvers rather than job seekers; that this needed a new, student centred approach to forestry education, to develop climate-smart, entrepreneurial minded graduates.

The final, SAWPA sponsored, theme "A Sector that is Driven by Innovation" included presentations by PG Bison's Tamaryn Whittal-Steynberg and PAMSA Executive Director Jane Molony, both of whom spoke about the innovation happening along the forest products value chain and how sustainable wood will really lead to a sustainable world.

The Webinar was concluded with a motivational talk by Burnout to Brilliance life coach Jacqui Meyer, whose presentation looked at the warning signs and remedies for burnout and whose words hit home to many of the women participating.

Khosi explains, "We wanted to give something back to the women already making such a huge mark on our industry. As women, we understand the delicate balance between work and family



life. We also understand the pressure to work harder, to stay later, to ensure your voice is heard and the impact this is having – particularly on women. Burnout is a global issue and a very real problem for many women (and men), we felt it was important to highlight this impact it can have and how small changes – including spotting the warning signs – can have," Katy explains.

In total, 226 unique logins signed into the webinar, although attendance is expected to be higher as many people logged in from a single computer. This included members of the forestry industry and its value chain, industry associations and institutions, forestry students and government representatives.

"The webinar raised over R100 000, which like last year, will be distributed to underprivileged schools in each of the forestry provinces. This is a significant amount more than was raised last year, as support for this important initiative grows. We are eternally grateful for the support of our sponsors, the Forest Sector Charter Council, FP&M Seta, Forestry South

Africa, Sappi, Mondi, NCT Forestry and all the theme sponsors previously mentioned. Their generosity not only made the webinar possible, but it has also meant "She is Forestry SA" can support future generations of women from the communities that neighbour our plantations", explains Julia Rees, She Is Forestry SA Director and Treasurer.

During the drama that always unfolds ahead of any webinar, I remember asking Katy and Khosi, "why do we do this to ourselves". Their answer was simple, "we do it to make a difference; if we can improve the life on a single individualbe it a woman already in forestry, one wishing to join our organisation or a child that benefits from the funds we raise – it will all be worth it."

Their belief that the SIF webinar could and would be a catalyst for change was realised shortly afterwards, when five schools – one in each forestry province – were gifted by She Is Forestry SA Casio calculators, face masks and gardening tools.

The 2020 webinar raised in total R70 000.00, which was distributed across five schools and brought 120 calculators, around 660 masks and 30 garden tools.

In Michelle Obama's autobiography she talks about her choice to focus on a single school as the First Lady and make a lasting impact there, before rolling it out further. It is an approach we intend to take too. There is so much need in our communities that it would be easy to overstretch ourselves whilst trying to help everyone. Instead, the Department of Education helped us identify one school in each province which really needed our help, and we intend to make a lasting difference to these schools, their staff and most importantly the learners.

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#### GROWING ENTREPRENEURS

The Gates Foundation has campaigned tirelessly for decades on Gender Equality, commissioning countless studies that have illustrated the positive impact women entering the workforce have on a country's economy. This is also true for the economies of rural communities where the positive impact of female employment is perhaps greatest, due to the high levels of unemployment and poverty. Two people who have first-hand experience of the impact projects that facilitate female employment and entrepreneurialism are, She Is Forestry SA POC members, Itumeleng Langeni, MTO Group: Chief Stakeholder Relations Officer, and Thobi Mkhize, Mondi: Head of Stakeholder Engagement.

"In the rural communities we work with a high proportion of women are the head of their households, either through being widowed or because of becoming the carer of orphaned grandchildren. These women need to provide for their families, they don't want to be reliant on pensions or handouts, they want to seize

any opportunity to generate their own income. Through creating an income, these women do not just put food on the table and acquire new skills, they become self-sufficient, and this restores their dignity" explains Itumeleng.

It is a sentiment that is echoed by Thobi, "Forestry entrepreneurial projects provide individuals and communities with income that they would not normally have. This income helps them satisfy their basic needs like food or fund essential activities such as schooling. This additional income is especially important in single-parent households. We have projects where 80% of those involved are female and the majority are single parents. Given the history of land dispossession and limited land ownership by women, projects that provide them free access to land unleashes the latent potential in women who have a truncated history of activity in agriculture."





#### Growing groundnuts into entrepreneurial endeavours MTO Group – Case Study Box

MTO offered 92 unemployed women from the 'Game' Village in White River, the opportunity of becoming self-sufficient by opening 37 hectares of forestry land to them, to plant groundnuts between the rows of trees in their young planted compartments.

"Initially, the women planted for their own consumption, ensuring food security for circa 460 family members. In 2021, to ensure the project's sustainability we supported the women by registering the project into various co-ops and sought a market for them to start generating an income from their groundnuts. In March of this year, they started harvesting their groundnuts to supply a peanut butter manufacturing company in Pretoria, Kalinda Trading," Itumeleng explained.

It doesn't stop there, the women are now being trained in business and financial management skills and MTO will release more land to them to expand their farming operations, now that they have secured a sustainable market. They also have a long-term plan to become peanut butter producers by partnering with the company they are currently supplying their nuts to.



"This project's success, and the impact it has had, has made us passionate about expanding it to other areas in Mpumalanga. We are already engaging with the community involved and hope to roll it out very soon. Forestry provides so many opportunities, I would encourage individuals and communities to come forward with proposals that they feel would benefit themselves and their communities," urged Itumeleng.

#### Mondi – Case Study Box

In 2015 a small group of women from communities adjacent to Mondi's plantation approached Mondi with the idea to utilize the excess land between the rows in the planted compartments to plant groundnuts, Jugo, and dry beans. In seven years, what started as a great idea has grown to 280 members producing food for their families and local markets. The profits have enabled members to feed their families, send their children to school, and in some cases, renovate their homes.

"Project members have told us that this has changed their lives for the better, both in terms of poverty alleviation and social cohesion. Working as groups has increased the levels of interactions many of the women have within their communities," Thobi explains.

Being able to function as a business group has been key to the success of this project. The women formed a project committee to whom Mondi then hands over a recently harvested compartment ahead of planting. The women start planting in August, monthly meetings are held with Mondi, and progress is monitored. The crops are harvested eight months into the project and the compartment is handed back to Mondi, with the Project Committee moving on to another newly harvested pre-planting compartment.

The project has been a successful and Mondi is looking to roll it out to other interested communities. "Mondi has committed to making more land available for the project



given the high demand, which has only been exacerbated due to COVID-19. Going forward, more and more Mondi forestry cycle operations will now be aligned to the project. We are also looking; to split the project into two seasonal activities, dry beans between February and June and groundnuts/Jugo beans from August to February. This will ensure a continuous flow of income and jobs throughout the year. We also believe that the financial security of participants should be linked with income saving schemes through the Self Help Groups. Ultimately, the idea is to gradually commercialize the project by looking at exploring utilizing equipment to improve planting efficiency that will subsequently increase the scale," Thobi continues.

Entrepreneurial initiatives, like those of Mondi and MTO, are sone of the pillars upon which She Is Forestry SA wants to build its foundations.

"Entrepreneurial opportunities provide an opening into our industry, an opportunity for individuals and communities to benefit from the low hanging fruit that we, as an industry, sometimes don't see. She is Forestry SA will play a critical role in facilitating this, providing access to the Sector through the networks that are formed within the organisation. They understand that women are the cornerstone of society, and that as an industry we need to address the misconception that forestry is a career that is only open to men and intercropping can coexist within forestry as an alternative means of generating an income. They therefore play a

critical role in encouraging women into the Sector and highlighting the depth of opportunity the industry offers," Itumeleng continues.

Entrepreneurship should be encourage from an early age and teaching it within schools is an area of interest for She Is Forestry SA. "In forestry, we are fortunate to have other things that we can use to create other items that we can sell to earn a living. I was inspired by the enthusiasm shown by the younger generation from the few primary schools that I visited where I showed them how to do beading, use grass to make bags, mats and much more. I am also appreciative of the She is Forestry SA initiative, serving as an enabler to expose and explore more in Forestry," remarked Busi, Mnguni, Small Scale Grower & chairperson of Forestry South Africa.

"It is important that we have organizations such as She is Forestry SA that are supporting women who want to elevate themselves out of poverty. We need to start encouraging them to look beyond the obvious, for instance, how they can move from raw to processed products to create more jobs and bring bigger incomes into their community. To help them look beyond our borders and utilise marketing channels like the Africa Free Trade arrangement to supply the much bigger SADC region. It sounds like a big step, but the opportunities do exist to develop these kinds of projects and enter huge markets. Organisations like She is Forestry SA will have a role in facilitating this," Thobi concludes.

"The first two Women In Forestry Webinars focused on promoting women in the Sector and the work being done by them respectively. The aim, in part, was to dispel any preconceptions that forestry was a male-only industry; by promoting both the women who are taking the Sector forwards, and the many career opportunities available to them.
