
She Is Forestry SA 2023/2024 – A Time to Shine

The answer, a combination of all three. A webinar that provided women with the opportunity to put forward the best versions of themselves and in doing so, help to breakdown some of the barriers placed in front of others. A webinar that challenged women to embrace 'their time to shine', inviting them to step up and become the role models and mentors needed by others, both inside the Sector and beyond it, in order to navigate the barriers they currently face.

The 2023 webinar, themed 'Your time to shine!', provided the perfect platform for women to embrace their inner potential before letting it shine out and light the way for others. Like a pebble cast into a lake, sharing your inner light with the wider world creates ripples that travel far beyond the original reach of the individual who released it.

Certainly, this has been the case for the four brave and inspirational young women who stepped forward to become our first forestry mentors. A need identified by the various schools

very different young women who shared their background, forestry journey and current role within the Sector in the hope their story would inspire the next generation of young women to follow them into forestry.

It was also perfectly captured in the inspirational keynote speech by Mondi CEO Vivien McMenamin, which will be discussed in a later article, and the brilliant entrepreneurship talk by MTO's Itumeleng Langeni.

The webinar also challenged the Sector to shine a light on the industrious nature of female small-scale growers, who have turned their hand to crafting natural products that are sourced from their forestry landholdings to supplement their income. Mama Busi Nguni took the audience on a wonderful trip to meet the craft women she has helped mentor, describing the challenges they face and the role the Sector can have in supporting these industrious entrepreneurs.

After the success of last year's back-a-buddy campaign, another webinar-based fundraiser was initiated, this time for toilet paper and printer paper. These two everyday staples most of us take for granted, our five schools often have to do without. The idea of a teacher being unable to print out a worksheet or a pupil being unable to use a toilet hygienically touched the heart of our amazing audience who donated over R10 000, which She Is Forestry SA matched. This will hopefully bridge the shortfall at our schools and enhance the educational experience for the learners there.

work, purpose-led planning and excellence
in this field ensured this webinar surpassed

The positive shift in the way Industry embraces and acknowledges the role of women within our Sector is encouraging. It was reflected in the outstanding nominations we received for the five She Is Forestry SA awards categories. Like last year, each of our nominees was worthy of being heralded the winner and while only five could be crowned, it perhaps should be said that the real winner on the night was our Sector for having such a myriad of phenomenal women at its disposal.

nside each of us there is a light, whose strength depends on whether we choose to feed the flames or douse them out. For too long, women have doused their light, afraid that if they let it burn too brightly they will attract negative attention. As such, the number of women putting themselves forward for mentor roles is vastly superseded by the number of men, and they are far less likely to challenge an idea or raise their heads above the parapet. It's sad for our gender, for the individuals themselves and for the Sector who misses out on their valuable contribution. The enemy here is not men, or work culture, it is our own inner voice. The unrelenting voice telling us we are not enough and that no one can find out. So rather than stand out, we shrink. Instead of letting our inner light shine out, we look for ways to dampen it down. This has to stop, as in doing this we are not just failing ourselves, we are failing future generations too." - Ms Makhosazana Mavimbela, Forest Sector Charter Council (FSCC) Executive Director and She Is Forestry SA Director and Coordinator

One woman whose light truly shines bright is industry stalwart and mentor to many, Mondi CEO Vivien McMenamin. Viv's inspiring 15-minute speech would not have felt out of place amongst the most watched TED talks, as she presented the five principles that have made a difference in her career (see page 7). Her bonus point, the need for perspective, seemed to voice the thoughts of many on the webinar chat. Here Viv identifies an impatience

amongst the youth, who seem to want it all and want it tomorrow. "You cannot start in an industry one day and expect to be CEO within the next five years. You simply have not given yourself the time to gain the experience you need within that industry. You must first consolidate your knowledge and yourself in that role. Trying to skip this stage will only lead to frustration and a poorer career journey. The first six months in any role is about learning, I believe unless you truly hate the role you're in, you should look to stay in it for a minimum of 5 years." What really flicked a switch, was Viv's suggestion that rather than looking for the next run up all the time, we should look to expand our skillset outwards by constantly looking for challenges, opportunities and projects to get involved in within your role and to grow and develop through them.

Viv's keynote speech was followed by a touching talk by FSCC Executive Director, Makhosazana (Khosi) Mavimbela. Khosi had been to all the schools She Is Forestry SA supports, handing out the menstrual cups last year's back-a-buddy initiative paid for. While at the schools she had the opportunity to speak to the Head Teachers and find out more about what their schools and learners really need. "It was humbling to hear the necessities they were lacking, while also inspiring to hear about the high aspiration initiatives they felt could benefit their learners. The best part was that I genuinely felt we could help with both! It is almost unimaginable that in today's South Africa there are still

schools struggling to fund the basics like toilet paper, but for many rural schools – certainly our five – this seems to be the reality. The same goes for printer paper, teachers want to create worksheets and homework but do not have the necessities to do this. Fortunately, we represent an industry that not only has the capacity to fund this, it creates them! While it was great to know we could help provide the basics with our next webinar back-a-buddy initiative, what truly excited me was the prospect of addressing their high aspiration hopes. The teachers wanted to provide their female learners with careers advice and role models and I knew webinar coordinator, FSA's Katy Johnson, would find a way of doing this."

The response to the four role-model three-minute videos was both incredible and overwhelming. The webinar chat exploded with congratulations for the four women involved and She Is Forestry SA for instigating the initiative. All four are now uploaded on the She Is Forestry SA YouTube channel and have been watched multiple times. They will be presented to the five schools during the 'toilet paper and printer paper handover' on a drive, which will be added to every year as we expand the videos to involve women working across the entire Sector and all its associated value chains. While the associated industry acclaim for the videos has been great, it is the impact these will have on the learners She Is Forestry SA is invested in, that will be this project's greatest reward.

After an inspiring panel discussion with the four women featured in the videos, Noxolo Ndlovu, Nonkululeko Ntinga, Yoliswa Phiri and Zinhle Mbuyazi, the focus of the webinar shifted from upliftment to entrepreneurialism. Itumeleng Langeni, MTO Group, gave an informative presentation on what entrepreneurialism

looks like in a forestry context, painting a brilliant picture of all the opportunities available to both women and men within a forestry setting. Viewers were then treated to another short video, this time celebrating the incredible craftsmanship of South Africa's small-scale growers who have had to diversify to survive. Khosi joined Mama Busi in this video and pledged She Is Forestry SA's ongoing support of this initiative in the form of sourcing all future Keynote Speaker and Award winner gifts from the ladies. "I have always believed in leading by example, if She Is Forestry SA pledges their support to these women then I believe others will too. We can't expect the industry to step up and support these ladies and then not do the same ourselves", explains Khosi in the video.

As with the previous year, the webinar closed with the She Is Forestry SA Award ceremony. This year an additional category was added, for female researchers, as so many were nominated the previous year. As always, the standard of nominee was exceptional and in our eyes they are all winners! However, this year the awards went to:

- Resounding contribution to the Forestry Sector and Forestry Value-Chain – Louise van Wyk, Sappi
- Resounding contribution to Forestry Research Melissa Raynolds, Forestry Molecular Genetics Programme
- Small-scale Grower Award Queen Sabathile Tembe
- Undergraduate Award Philasande Bhentshu
- Postgraduate Award Noxolo Ndlovu

It is fair to say the 2023 Webinar was a conclusive success, with 332 audience members who included representatives from six government departments, nine industry associations, 12 SA forestry companies, 17 SA and four international forestry businesses, five SA and four international universities, three high schools and ten international NGOs and NPOs. It resulted in five published articles and over 750 video views and truly showcased how the South African Forestry Sector celebrates and uplifts women.





She Is Forestry SA is not just an organisation, it is a beacon of hope for women in the Forestry Sector. It's value-add and contribution cuts across the value chain, including education. Over the years, through the webinar, we have witnessed heart-felt stories where women and beneficiaries of our work have shared how She Is Forestry SA has not only impacted, but transformed, their lives. To witness others being awarded for great work, is a source of great personal pleasure. In the famous words of Graca Machel "Our lives will only have meaning if each one of us can confidently say that I was able to bring five, ten, fifteen and twenty women along with me... do not climb alone.

Learning from a legend – five rules to grow by

Adapted from Vivien McMenamin's 2023 She Is Forestry SA Keynote Speech

Before you lead others, you need to lead yourself

To be an authentic leader, you need to have good self-knowledge of two things. First, your core values. These provide the internal compass that will keep you on a right course independent of the changing circumstances. Viv explains how her core values of non-racialism and female empowerment have been at the heart of most career decisions she made throughout her varying roles in politics, government and now industry. The second is an understanding of your strengths and weakness and the willingness to accept, embrace and talk openly about these. "Too many women in particular are nervous to talk about their weaknesses. They see identifying a weakness as a sign of being weak, and this really is not the case. By knowing your strengths and capitalising on these, while staying aware of your weaknesses and circumnavigating these, often with the help of your colleagues, you are a far stronger person than someone who ignores them."

Develop a vision for self

True progression, personally or professionally, starts with a vision. A clear idea of where you are and where you want to be, obviously this will evolve, but I believe it is important to spend time developing this regularly. "Personally, I have a five-year vision with associated annual goals. These are not New Year resolutions, they are clear targets that are realistic, measurable and timely. Every year I set out to achieve these goals, I then reflect on what changed, what I should carry forward and what needs leaving behind."

Build your network

"When it was first suggested that I should build a network in my 30s I felt somewhat repulsed, it seemed somehow manipulative and insincere. What I have come to realise is it is perhaps the polar opposite, as a network cultivates relationships and keeps them alive." When Viv discusses her network she highlights the important role her mentors have played, especially at crossroads in her life, stressing the importance of bouncing pros and cons of big decisions off someone you respect and whose values align with yours.



Asking for advice is not a sign of weakness

There is often a misconstrued expectation amongst women that they have to be the readymade product, the finished article. This often acts as a barrier to them asking for advice. To be an effective manager you must accept that you are unlikely to be the most knowledgeable person in the room, especially at the start of a new job. As a leader you need to learn, engage and absorb knowledge, advice and perspectives from your colleagues. To do this, you need to ask for advice. "In this respect, I believe many women have got it completely wrong. The real sign of weakness is not asking for advice."

Learn from feedback

"Of all the points mentioned above, this has perhaps had the greatest impact on me as a leader. It came from an observation by the coach I saw in my 30s, who identified that I described my career as a solo journey. No career is a solo journey, it's a team effort. This resulted in a fundamental shift in how I looked at my career and has contributed greatly to my growth and development." Learning from feedback is important, at Mondi Viv describes the 360-degree feedback they receive every two years and how the feedback always has some element that niggles. "What I have learnt, is that the niggle is the single most important part of the feedback. We need to lean into the uncomfortable nature of feedback rather than leaning away from it."

hile 2023 felt like the year where we turned a corner, and placed COVID-19 and the economic downturn it brought behind us, there was still a lot of political and economic uncertainty. With uncertainty comes fear of scarcity, which is never a good environment into which you launch a charity appeal. While the generosity and outpouring of support we received for the three previous years' webinars provided some comfort, there was still a sense of foreboding when the webinar team got together to discuss fundraising.

This year, we hoped to make a truly lasting impact on the five schools we support by creating videos that could be used by them and others to promote careers advice and provide inspiring female role models. It was an initiative sparked by the schools themselves and supported by the entire POC, but it would also take fundraising requirements to the next level. On top of that, we were planning an additional award category and to support the small-scale grower craftswomen by presenting our Keynote Speaker and award winners with crafted gifts. Would we get the financial backing needed to make these big ideas a reality?

Thankfully, again weeks of concern and anxiety gave way to gratitude and immense pride as the donations rolled in. Companies who had supported the initiative from day one were joined by new sponsors willing to come on board to make 'lasting change'. In total, a staggering

R270 000 was raised through corporate sponsorship, illustrating both the generosity of our Sector and the worthiness of the cause.

In many ways it was like a webinar version of the movie 'Groundhog Day'! The same pre-webinar nerves were doused by the same incredible show of industry support. Any webinar nerves left over were quickly vanquished by the humbling generosity of our webinar audience, who came on board with our 'back-a-buddy' campaign donating nearly R10 000, which She Is Forestry SA matched for the toilet paper and printer paper drive.

"As webinar coordinator, I always feel especially apprehensive about standing there and asking a faceless audience to donate their hard-earned cash during a cost of living crisis. I never take it for granted that we will get any donations on the day, let alone hit our fundraising targets. When we do, the sense of pride, joy and heartfelt thanks, is almost impossible to put into words. During the webinar, R50 000 was given out as prize money to the five She Is Forestry SA Award winners. R45 5250 was spent on the webinar hosting and graphic design costs. R25 000 will be spent on toilet paper and printer paper for the five schools and a further R75 000 on acquiring hard drives to place the role model videos, educational items such as calculators, whiteboards, and extra paper stocks as required by each school.

There is currently R213 709 in the She Is Forestry SA bank account. This has been earmarked for several exciting projects in 2024, including printing additional copies of the She Is Forestry SA Magazine for distribution at the schools we support, as well as other educational institutions.

Globally, 2023 has had to be a year of austerity, yet for She Is Forestry SA it has been another year of amazing abundance despite the uncertainty brought by political and economic challenges. She Is Forestry SA is acutely aware of the importance of spending these funds wisely to maximise the benefit they bring. We understand the importance of working closely with the schools to ensure the funds we generate bring about sustainable, lasting change that meets their needs. The role model videos not only meet the needs of our five schools, but they can be rolled out to all schools, making an impact countrywide. These initiatives have been approved by the She Is Forestry SA Directors and are in the process of being implemented. The effectiveness of each initiative our donations support will continue to be monitored and reviewed.

Establishing the Awards as part of the She Is Forestry SA legacy

he She Is Forestry SA Awards were certainly the highlight of the 2022 webinar for many people, not least because they provided an opportunity to formally acknowledge the important role women play, from the start of the forestry value chain in the many forestry nurseries to the other end where the myriad of forest products are created.

In 2023, we wanted to build on last year's success and make the Awards part of the She Is Forestry SA legacy. We also expanded it, by introducing a new category – Resounding Contribution to Forestry Science – to acknowledge the large amount of research-based nominations we had received the first year.

Five winners were eventually selected, although it should be noted that every woman nominated was a worthy winner. Sappi's Louise van Wyk, nominated by Forestry South Africa for her contribution to their Environmental Management Committee, was presented with the "Resounding Contribution to the Forestry Sector and Value-Chain Award". While Queen Sabathile Tembe took home the award "Recognising the Contribution of Small-Scale Growers" due to her ongoing support and commitment to her community.

Melissa Reynolds, nominated by the Forest Molecular Genetic Programme won the "Resounding Contribution to Forestry Science Award" for her role in the innovative forestry research happening across the Sector.

While there were more student nominations than last year, the organisers did feel slightly despondent not to have a submission from every Higher Education Institute running an undergraduate or postgraduate forestry programme. The awards are a platform where all nominees are showcased, giving them industry exposure that could benefit their future career prospects. Then there is the R10 000 prize money, that would benefit our student winners perhaps more than any other cohort.

A huge congratulations must go to
Undergraduate Award winner, Pilasande
Bhentshu, whose academic excellence
and commitment to her fellow students
scooped her the award. As well as
Postgraduate Award winner, Noxolo
Ndlovu, whose academic brilliance was
noted not only by her university who
nominated her but also her funding body.
We are certain that we will be seeing a lot
more from both ladies, as well as all the
other nominees in the future.

his webinar was all about the importance of keeping two lights burning. The internal light inside us, which we must feed rather than subdue, and the light we shine on others. The role model videos were the perfect combination of both.

It was an opportunity for the She Is Forestry SA POC to take a step back, allowing space for the light to fall on the four young women who stepped up to be forestry role models. This enabled their growth, while also giving them the encouragement to feed their internal flame. The light that shines from these exceptional young women will light the path for other high school learners who feel they have very few options available to them.

We need to provide them with one, with role models they can relate to and that will inspire them to stay at school and pursue career avenues they previously never dreamed of."

Mama Busi Mnguni, the solution seeker

ew characters in forestry
are as vibrant and colourful
as Mama Busi, a small-scale
grower, FSA Executive
Committee member and She
Is Forestry SA visionary. Indeed, there
are many accolades you could pin to this
diminutive woman with a big personality.
Perhaps the quality she is most often
praised for is her capacity to uplift others
through her own drive, determination and
persistence.

"For a small-scale grower, with 2 to 3 hectares of planted trees, the long rotation time is the most challenging aspect of forestry. We know we should leave our trees in the ground for 7 years plus to get the maximum profit from their fibre, but many of us simply cannot afford to do that. They harvest early, losing any profit they will see and have to face the reality of their expenditure outweighing any income made from the harvest. It is hard", Mama Busi explains.

While many would despair, or turn to annual cash crops for smaller, but regular, financial returns, Mama Busi likes to think beyond the obvious.

"In our landholdings we have many natural materials that our ancestors have been using for years to create items they could barter with or sell. We still have those materials and there are still some of us with the skills needed to make these cultural heritage crafts, this could be the solution", she continues.

Mama Busi, alongside other small-scale female foresters, have set up a community of crafts people determined to substitute their inter-rotation incomes while passing cultural heritage crafts down to the next generation.

As she explains, "the clay from the ground here was used by our ancestors to make pots for Zulu beer, now we use the same clay and skills to make beautiful home decorations. Beading was the way our grandmothers communicated to our grandfathers in the past, a small splash of white beads was a sign of love, combinations of yellow and white indicated pregnancy. They harvested the palm leaves to make bags, baskets and sunhats. These skills and these items still have a use today, we have the women who can make them, all we need now is the market."

That is where She Is Forestry SA comes in, as co-ordinator Makhosazana Mavimbela explains, "forestry is a complex network of small, medium and corporate growers, where small-scale growers, like Mama Busi, help satisfy the fibre demand of the corporate companies. It is a relationship that both sides benefit from and should therefore ensure it remains sustainable. Listening to the craftswomen, they are

passionate about forestry but fear it is no longer viable to do in isolation. They have shown great aptitude and drive to find a solution, now they need help to bring that to a receptive market. Here is where the corporates and associations like She Is Forestry SA can help. As She Is Forestry SA, we will use our webinar to promote their crafts and we will lead by example, sourcing our keynote speakers and award winners' gifts from these ladies going forward. I believe that if you show a willingness first, others in the Sector will follow, and I am certain we have the capacity and inclination as a Sector to support these women and help them find a market for crafts."

Mama Busi and the other small-scale growers who have turned to cultural crafts to substitute their income are a great example that forestry is not just about the trees. he Forestry Sector accounts for about a quarter1 of the agricultural sector's GDP alone, demonstrating its incredible power and potential as an economic accelerator and job creator. From the vast timber plantations spanning the hills and valleys of Mpumalanga to the busy sawmills and pulp manufacturers in KwaZulu-Natal, and even vibrant textile manufacturers in the Western Cape, the Forestry Sector's reach spans the length and breadth of the country, reverberating throughout value chains, supporting thousands of breadwinners, and touching millions of lives.

It is good news for South Africa, the Sector's future is bright. Amidst increasing focus on environmental sustainability, the option of wood as a renewable product has seen consumer preferences shift towards eco-friendly paper packaging. Seen together with rapid growth in e-commerce and online shopping, this means that in today's digital age, paper is far from obsolete. Instead, the forest product market represents an area of untapped growth potential.

Likewise, the emergence of green construction trends has driven demand for wooden building materials and furniture.

As a result, the World Bank predicts a fourfold increase in global timber demand by 2050, further fuelled by population growth.

However, for the Forestry Sector to truly thrive, we need to grow its capacity, hone its competitiveness, and embrace innovation

Consider that replenishing timber reserves takes decades, and increased emphasis on resource management will be required to ensure a steady supply and maintain competitiveness. Companies will also need

to optimise their operations and resource utilisation.

Additionally, environmental concerns will necessitate a shift towards sustainability-focussed innovation and transformation throughout supply chains. The local Sector will need to prioritise the development of eco-friendly products and processes to remain relevant, while maintaining cost-efficiency and quality.

To successfully meet this challenge, the Sector will therefore need to explore the benefits of new technologies. For example, a recent McKinsey study notes that businesses in the Paper and Forest Products Sector could realise improvements in productivity of up to 15% by implementing existing digital and analytics tools.

This transformation will require fresh thinking and approaches, as well as active participation and collaboration from both the public and private sectors. We cannot afford to continue with business as usual or allow monopolies in thinking. Only by embracing change, encouraging the input of diverse voices, fostering new skills, and promoting innovative technologies, can we build a stronger, future-proof sector.

Diversity is the foundation of creativity, flexibility, and agility, leaving businesses and sectors more open to out-of-the-box ideas and disruption. Critically, within South Africa's Forestry Sector, this means that we must empower women to enter and take up leadership positions within the sector, lending us the benefit of their contributions, skills, and expertise. We, too, must grow our own timber, and invest in and nurture our talent pipeline.

Demonstrating the importance of gender diversity, a recent study of companies in the S&P 1500 over the past 15 years found



that a 10% increase in the representation of women on the board of directors – which was equivalent to the addition of just one female director – translated into a 17.5% increase in a company's environmental rating.

The Fibre Processing and Manufacturing (FP&M) SETA is a local leader in this regard, as we support initiatives and provide training programmes aimed at upskilling women in forestry, while providing them with the necessary work experience, job opportunities, and resources to build flourishing careers and businesses.

Through partnerships with entities such as with Forestry South Africa and its She Is Forestry SA initiative, we aim to create a female-led workforce that is skilled in the use of current processes and technologies and equipped with the tools and resources needed to actively seek out innovation.

The 13 sub-sectors that we serve ultimately represent a major proportion of the economy, and through its varied linkages, forestry remains an integral part of producing essential consumer products by South Africans, for South Africans. In collaboration with the She Is Forestry SA initiative, we therefore champion the advancement of women in forestry, to ensure that they are provided with the necessary support, training, and access to resources, and that they receive the recognition they deserve as inspirations within this dynamic Sector.
